Laurel Oaks celebrated Veteran's Day by a wreath laying ceremony by the Laurel Oaks AFJROTC Unit at the flagpoles in the outside mall area. This ceremony included speeches by each of the CTSO presidents and president of Student Council and NTHS. An assembly of the entire student body including all staff members attended this ceremony. During lunchtime, veterans were invited and welcomed to have lunch on Laurel Oaks to recognize their service to our country. Thank you pens and pictures of Matt Maupin were handed out.

National Technical Honor Society members, students in Postsecondary Math and English and senior Cosmetology students went on a special field trip Wednesday, November 9 to the Dayton Art Institute. The Art Institute has the unique privilege of hosting an exhibition from Egypt entitled "The Quest for Immortality." The exhibit details the ancient Egyptian obsession with the afterlife and features artifacts from ancient burial chambers dating back to 1500 BC. Students were able to view a mummy in its coffin, canopic jars, a stone sarcophagus weighing over 7,000 pounds, and numerous golden and lapis lazuli jewelry pieces. The exhibit also featured statues, an ancient wooden boat and papyrus funeral scrolls called "Going Forth by Day." The culmination of the tour was a recreation of the tomb of Thutmose III, an Egyptian ruler from the 15th century BC. The tomb was recreated from everything to cracks in the stone ceiling to the 12-hour funeral journey called the "Amduat" painstakingly written on the walls in hieroglyphics. At the end of the tour, students were able to have their names printed in Egyptian hieroglyphics.

Laurel Oaks NTHS sponsored a non-perishable food drive from November 28 to December 9th to benefit the less fortunate during the holiday season. The food drive included a competition between career programs with the winner getting a free lunch at Laurel Oaks Frisch's on December 20th. The winner will be determined based on the average number of cans per student enrollment. This provides career programs with lower enrollment a chance of winning. The food drive is to help our 'needy students' and their families and allows for the spirit of giving as well.

On Saturday, December 3, 2005 Laurel Oaks AFJROTC competed in the JROTC Drill Meet hosted by and held at the Scarlet Oaks campus. Judges will come from the Air Force ROTC detachment at the University of Cincinnati with over six schools expected to compete. The students in the Information Technology class at Amelia High School are generating very creative web designs. One project included six images that fade from one image to the next on the home page, plus a marquee strolling from right to left on the page. Mrs. Parker and Mrs. Dyer also report that their students' final projects are near completion. Each student is creating a one-page collage of pictures of their classmates and Amelia High School staff with special features applied such as montage, cropping, and grayscale on up to as many as 40 images per page.

The Instructional Resource Center hosted the 4th Annual Great Oaks DECA Mini-Spring competition on Tuesday, December 6, 2005. 110 students from Diamond, Live, Scarlet, plus Anderson, Sycamore, and Winton Woods, took a first step to prepare for District, State and National competitions. The Mini-spring competition pits Great Oaks students against one another to learn the rigors of competition in eleven events before they reach the first level at Districts in the beginning of February. It is entirely organized by the instructors with the help of 11 judges consisting of Advisory Council members, employers and graduates.

Nancy Rudduck at Clinton Massie reports that one of her Info Tech students (Murat Dayhanov from Turkmenistan) had a project posted to Applied Technologies web site, <http://www.applied-technologies.com>. On Nov. 15, he also presented his PowerPoint presentation to all Info Tech classes, informing the students about his country. The students enjoyed learning about Turkmenistan, especially having their personal questions answered by Murat.

Bill Reinhart at Princeton H.S. reports that his Applied Technology students have been engaged not only in technology modules but in competitive simulations as well. Students have been engaged in completing experiments and projects from SAE and the National Association of Home Builders. They've used the simulation program called "Building Homes of Our Own" to design, build, and sell a home.

The Indian Hill Marketing II classes have completed sales presentations to assist them in preparation for role-play situations such as the upcoming DECA competitions, according to Phil Said. In addition to participating in the role-plays, they also completed a paper on their topic to further explore the product or service that they selected.

Students in Aaron Bradley's Business Management program at Taylor High School are currently operating a "giving tree" project for children in the community. His Business Principles classes are running the project which serves two purposes: helping area families in need, and teaching business students about departmental management and business communication by experiencing project management first hand.

Students in both classes are placed in one of four departments, each with different duties associated with running the tree. A marketing department is responsible for all efforts to promote project; a PR department handles all outside communication to the school and community; the inventory department records the daily gifts arriving and being distributed including a spreadsheet with current totals of gifts filled and left to be filled; and a production department that wraps gifts daily, delivers thank-you notes to senders, and keeps the tree looking neat and clean. Students are practicing hands-on applications of the curriculum while gaining a sense of accomplishment by working together to help others this holiday.

Mt. Healthy Family and Consumer Science students operate a Book Buddy program which is extremely beneficial for the kindergarteners as well as the high schoolers, according to Pat Pritz. The goal is to help students in the high school Child Development class develop an understanding of how caregivers impact the physical, emotional, social and intellectual development of the children they are for. Pat invites a reading specialist to talk to the students about the importance of reading to children and demonstrate techniques for teaching reading as well as some literacy activities. Then each high school student is paired with a kindergarten student at Greener Elementary. The high schoolers visit the kindergarten class

several times and each reads to his or her Book Buddy. The kindergarten teachers report that their students pay closer attention in the one-on-one setting. The high school buddies ask questions to check their buddy's comprehension. Tight bonds are created between many of the buddies as the kindergarteners are often seen sitting in the laps of the older students or eagerly running to greet them when they come in. A kindergarten instructor reported, "My students are so excited when I tell them it is a book buddy day and are so sad when the visits are over. I see some responsibility growing in the high school students when they realize they have a young child who is depending on them."

The Creative Foods classes at Reading have made 50 lbs. of fudge for the U.S. military personnel serving in Iraq while the Life Skills students have finished 120 corn hole bags for them. Both items were on the holiday wish list sent by the service men and women to the U.S. Military Support Committee. The U.S. Military Support Committee will ship the items to Iraq. The class projects complete FCCLA skill event requirements and allow the students to use skills they have developed in the classroom to help others.

The FCCLA members are using their lunchtime to serve the local community one Friday a month by participating in Benson Street Clean-up. The students and teachers, Ms. Hopewell & Ms. Roberts, are supplied with trash bags and plastic gloves by the high school custodian to use while collecting trash along one of the main streets in Reading. The Benson Street clean up also allows the students to walk an extra mile during the month.

The Marksmanship Teams from Northwest High School, Hamilton High School, and Scarlet Oaks CDC all arrived ready to compete.

The match was held indoors in Diamond Oaks IDEA Room and was a great success. All teams were obviously well drilled in marksmanship and safety procedures. Each team sent six cadets to the line with the top five scores counting for the competition.

This meet was significant for two reasons. One, the Hamilton High School team earned an aggregate score of 1010. This is the first time in the history of our local competitions that a team has "broke" the 1000-point barrier. Two, Cadet Brian Pope of Diamond Oaks earned a score of 236 out of a possible 300 to take "Top Score" honors for the meet. His score was the highest individual score recorded in the history of our local high school competitions.

The two milestones along with a safe, well-run marksmanship match made for an extraordinary competition.

Hamilton High School earned first place honors with the top score of 1010, followed by the Cadets of Diamond Oaks with a score of 903 to take the second place trophy. Northwest High School earned third place honors in this, its first competition hosted by Diamond Oaks CDC.
